

## Remote Teaching: Core Focus

We are looking for a few things here in this temporary transition online. What matters most here is continuity, contact, and care.





# Continuity

By **continuity**, we mean our duty is to provide our students with some teaching provision. We are prioritising that. Get your content into Learn, start a discussion there, record whatever you need to record on Mediahopper, run a live session from Collaborate. That is what we mean by continuity.





#### Contact

Contact is different but equally important online. Without it, emotional and social distance increases and student engagement decreases.

This contact involves clear and consistent communications.

A weekly announcement on Monday to announce what the students are expected to do. Active participation on the discussion boards at intervals during the week.

Be present.



#### Care



Care for your students as this is a challenging time for them as well. Use supportive and encouraging tones when possible. Check to make sure all are active. Ask if anyone is having difficulties accessing these technologies as some will struggle.

Second is self-care. Yours. There is no need to be online 24 hours a day.


